Beginning in the 1890s, the Illinois Central Railroad Electric Line expanded into what was largely undeveloped farmland between Jackson Park and 79th St, from Lake Michigan to Stony Island, setting the stage for one hundred years of development and demographic change. From Hyde Park to Jeffery Manor and South Chicago, the pictures contained in Chicago's South Shore show many of the faces, places, and events that marked the evolution of the area.
